is Professor of Architecture at the State University of New York at Buffalo and President of BOSTI, a design/research organization. He is known for his work on the effect of office design on productivity and quality of worklife, archetypes in the design of "charged" and sacred places, and the transformation of public life and public place.

is Associate Professor of Landscape Architecture at the Iowa State University at Ames and author of various articles. He is currently working on a book on public life and public places in western cities.

is Professor of Architecture and Landscape Architecture at the University of California, Berkeley. Mark Francis

is Professor of Landscape Architecture at the University of California, Davis, where he directs the Center for Design Research. His research and professional interest centers on environmental meaning and how its dimensions can be translated into landscape and urban design.

Jan Gehl

is an architect and Senior Lecturer at the School of Architecture, Royal Danish Academy of Fine Arts in Copenhagen. Gehl has studied and taught internationally, including visiting professorships at the Universities of Edinburgh, Toronto, Melbourne and California, Berkeley. His principal work is *Life Between Buildings—Using Public Space*.

Lawrence Halprin

is an internationally renowned landscape architect and planner. His work has ranged from large scale, ecologically based plans, such as that for Sea Ranch, to intensively used urban open spaces, such as Forecourt Fountain in Portland, Freeway Park in Seattle, and others in Jerusalem, Minneapolis, and New York. His writings include the books *R.S.V.P. Cycles* and *Cities*.
